CONCEPT NOTE

What if Digital Anthropology could help us understand societies in the digital era to empower leaders to make better decisions?

As our cultures continue to change with digital transformation, leaders need to understand the transformational effects of how people and cultures are interacting and connecting across digital platforms, so they can make relevant decisions that are sensitive to the cultural context of their communities.

While digital anthropology has been around for decades and has been influential in studying digital life across a myriad of forms, the field's main methodology of ethnography or even digital ethnography has not kept up with the pace and scale of the digital world. It can take months to years for insights to move from the field to the page. This is too slow for leaders today. We need new expressions and forms of digital ethnography to provide faster insights into the online world, at the speed and scale of data science.

Digital anthropology needs innovation in response to the rapid pace of digital transformation and its impact on all aspects of societies, cultures, and people in the digital world.
